DIRECTOR'S REPORT



Matthew Isert Bender, Executive Director

In 2023, we began our 40th anniversary celebrations which will culminate in a 40th Gala on June 19, 2024. ICC emerged as a movement of citizens coming together who recognized the need for affordable, professional mental health support for all people within the local rural community. These core values remain at the heart of who ICC is today.

A key focus of my work shifted in 2023 to the financial sustainability of ICC. This is crucial as in 2023 we had our second straight year of over a \$30,000 deficit. Through the government of Canada, Community Support Recovery Fund, ICC was able to hire an Awareness and Engagement Coordinator, expanding our capacity for social media and fundraising work. Connected to this we implemented the Canada Helps Donor Management System to help us track and communicate with our supporters. Fundraising revenue through internal events, third party events and through donations is essential to the sustainability of ICC.

Community partnerships and collaboration was and is at the heart of who we are as ICC. The group of leaders which met in 1982 and then became the Founding Directors in 1983, consisted of two local high school guidance counsellors, a local Elementary School Principal, Anglican, Lutheran and Mennonite Pastors (one from Tavistock, one from Wellesley and 4 from Wilmot), a medical Doctor, Naturopathic Doctor, a few dedicated business leaders and community members. ICC developed through the passion, hard work and coming together of the community. This continues, collaboration and partnerships were at the heart of work in 2023 and the final pages of this report give witness to this. Together with WFRC we promoted Mental Health and Relationship wellness through the Mental Health Breakfast, World Suicide Prevention walk, and In the Know, a mental health training for the agricultural community. Through creative partnerships, with Lutherwood, Community Care Concepts, Porchlight and Counselling Collaborative Waterloo Region we receive funding for counselling in our local community as we do our part to help support the whole Region. Trinity Lutheran Church continues to go above and beyond in their role as our landlords in supporting our work in the community. Collaboration and partnerships are key to our sustainability in 2024 and beyond.

The bedrock of ICC remains our compassionate, skilled, and professional staff team. I am inspired daily by their commitment to counselling excellence and their deep care for the individuals they counsel. This report gives witness to professional service delivered this past year. In conclusion, I am humbled and awed daily in my role by the dedicated board, caring professional staff team, committed volunteers, generous donors, and the brave and courageous clients who seek healing and transformation through our services: healing, transformation and growth is hard work. It is a privilege as Executive Director to build upon our 40 year history, to guide the current work we do and to lead into who we are becoming as we collaborate with others seeking to meet the Mental Health and Wellness needs of our community.

Since 1983 (our founding year) there have been at least 108 people who have served on our Board. Not all of them could make it, but all of them deserve our gratitude for supporting such a fine community institution. This spring (you may have heard) we're hosting a Gala to celebrate these 40 years. This is our way of saying thank you (and doing a little fundraising). I hope to see you there. These events are a complement to our tried-and-true fundraising efforts: the annual calendar lottery and the Silent Auction. We've had so much support over the years. The last pages of this report are also my favourites. (Well, the middle pages are pretty good too.) These pages list the organizations, businesses and friends who are part of the donors' network, truly, a fantastic example of 'it takes a village...' Our fervent hope and pledge is to be worthy of your continued support and goodwill.

There are three things on my mind as I think of the year and years ahead for the Board. The 21-25 Strategic Plan will be reviewed and revised as we look to where ICC will be by the end of the decade. A big piece of this will include further development of our fundraising capacities. A great institution relies on the amazing generosity of its community to serve and support mental health needs. We're excited to continue finding ways to help caring people in our community make care more accessible and available in our community.
