EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

I write this report grounded in the "Heart of the Matter - serving as stewards of the ongoing contribution that ICC has made to the health and well-being of the local community, building on ICC's strengths, learning from ICC's challenges, meeting the future that is coming towards us and nurturing a healthy and responsive organizational culture that is resilient and adaptable." These words guided the formation of our current strategic plan, how we functioned throughout 2022 and into 2023.

In 2022, we continued with a hybrid model of counselling service including telephone, video, and in-person options. Approximately 25% of our service was offered virtually, in the coming years, this will remain an accessible and effective service delivery option for ICC. The return to more in-person events brought positive energy to us at ICC, for example, the November Mental Health Breakfast focused on Mental Health in the rural community was a highlight of the year. This event hosted at the Puddicombe Banquet Hall was a joint adventure with Wilmot Family Resource Centre a key partner of ours in serving Wilmot and surround communities.

A core ICC value is ensuring professional, affordable, accessible, and personalized care for all in our community. In 2021, we raised our counselling rate to \$110 which more closely aligns with our CCWR partner agencies and recognizes the professionalism of our services. The increase was important, and it accentuated the gap between those who can afford counselling and those we cannot. In 2022, I was able for the first time in my role to meet in-person with many Business, Church and Service club leaders to learn from them and to share of and invite them to be support our work in the community. We need grants and local community financial support to ensure that all can receive professional counselling services.

The bedrock of ICC remains our compassionate, skilled, and professional staff team. I appreciate the Board's commitment to care for the staff through a plan to increase compensation by 6% and supporting staff training and team building activities. Like many workplaces, ICC has been impacted by staff transitions throughout 2022. A key focus in 2023 is grounding the staff in our identity, nurturing the staff team and revitalizing and creating new services. I am humbled and awed daily in my role by the dedicated board, caring professional staff team, committed volunteers, generous donors, and the brave and courageous clients who seek healing and transformation through our services. In 2023, building on ICC strengths, I am filled with hope, in the words of Julian of Norwich.





